A MESSAGE FROM THE CHAPTER PRESIDENT...


Brother Knights of the Pittsburgh Chapter,



SET YOUR GPS/APP FOR DIRECTIONS TO PITTSBURGH CHAPTER COUNCIL MEETING AT ST. CATHERINE OF SIENA – 199 McGovern Boulevard; Crescent, PA 15046

From I-79 North: Get off Exit 65 and take Route 65 towards Sewickley. Continue driving to Ambridge and turn right on 8th St/PA989. Then turn left onto Maplewood Ave. Take the third left onto 11th St. 11th St becomes the Ambridge Aliquippa Bridge. Turn left onto Constitution Blvd/PA51. Continue to follow PA51. St Catherine is on the right just past PA151.

From I-79 South: Get off Exit 59B and take I376 towards Airport. Drive past the Airport and get off Exit 48 toward Hopewell. Turn right onto Gringo Rd/PA151 toward Hopewell/ South Heights/Ambridge. Continue on PA151 crossing Brodhead Rd. Turn right onto PA51 and St Catherine is on the right.

Individuals who choose to take PA51 through Coraopolis will need to follow detour at Stoop Ferry Rd (Road is closed just before McGovern Blvd since bridge is being removed and replaced).





K of C DONATES \$250,000 TO AID TO BAHAMAS

The Knights of Columbus announced it will donate at least \$250,000 in assistance to the Bahamas in the wake of Hurricane Dorian.

Local Knights have already begun to help the islands' more than 70,000 residents who are coping with the massive destruction caused by the natural disaster.



Members of the Knights of Columbus are also preparing to help in Georgia and the Carolinas, which are expected to be affected by Dorian.

KNIGHTS ADDRESS OPIODS CRISIS



In a single Pennsylvania county, more than 400 people have died from opioid overdoses since 2016. The local Knights of Columbus are doing everything they can to educate their community and save lives.

John F. Kennedy Knights of Columbus Council 372 in Pittston organized The Opioid Fact Forum

to inform families on the dangers of opioid abuse and speak candidly about the epidemic. This is just one of the many ways Knights around the world are promoting the culture of life and fighting to protect those who can't protect themselves.

The Knights advertised the event through local newspapers and television, bringing 100 people to the forum. Among the speakers were a drug and alcohol specialist, as well as a local judge and a coroner. Finally, a parent who lost a child to opioid abuse spoke, illustrating the horrible truth of the epidemic — those claimed by overdose were often young people.

Yonki spearheaded the event along with his brother Knights, handing attendees bags of resources. Along with the Knights council's local parishes, they invited members of 15 other local churches to attend. The Knights' diverse marketing strategy also resulted in their event being advertised during Saturday Night Live and the Christian Broadcasting Network on local affiliates.

"We just wanted the people in our service area to know that the Knights of Columbus is taking on the opioids abuse problem," Yonki said.

The Knights concluded the event with a question-and-answer session. Attendees used this time to share their own stories of overdose and its effects on their friends and family. The responsiveness of those present showed the Knights had identified a major need in their community.

WHAT ARE YOU WAITING FOR?

I don't want to bore you with lots of statistics, but a recent survey from LIMRA (Life Insurance Marketing Research Association) found that only 59% of Americans own life insurance and about half of those are underinsured. Fr. McGivney lived both the social and the financial insecurity of a desperate family, with the breadwinner suddenly taken, that had to be supported. He left the seminary to work and support his mother and siblings. He didn't want other Catholic families to find themselves in such a predicament. That, and uniting men of faith, was the impetus for establishing our Order. Everyone who joined in those first years was insured; that was part and parcel of being in the organization. Now every member has a choice and every member should know what we do, and how we do it. Here's the process I use when I meet with families:

- 1. Discover Identify & prioritize your financial goals
- 2. Gather Data Collect facts & figures based on your current situation
- 3. Analyze Input data, run calculations, identify shortfalls
