

A MESSAGE FROM OUR CHAPLAIN

Brother Knights,

November is a solemn month to call to mind our hope in the Resurrection of Christ and His triumph over sin and death. We mark this by our celebration of the Solemn Feast Day of All Saints on November 1. We are in such great need of the prayers and intercession of the Saints in our time. Call on them for all your needs, as they are in the presence of God. All the Saints, pray for us.

November also is a time of special remembrance of all the souls of the faithful departed. We pray for our beloved family, friends, and loved ones who have died. We commend them to the mercy God that "they may receive the reward of their goodness." (see Christian Burial Ritual) November 2 marks the Remembrance of All Souls Day. It is a day to offer our prayers to God and pray for the

souls of the dead. This concept of praying for the dead comes from the Sacred Scriptures. The second Book of Maccabees says, ⁴³ He (Judas Maccabeus) also took up a collection, man by man, to the amount of two thousand drachmas of silver, and sent it to Jerusalem to provide for a sin offering. In doing this he acted very well and honorably, taking account of the resurrection. 44 For if he were not expecting that those who had fallen would rise again, it would have been superfluous and foolish to pray for the dead. 45 But if he was looking to the splendid reward that is laid up for those who fall asleep in godliness, it was a holy and pious thought. Therefore he made atonement for the dead, so that they might be delivered from their sin. (2 Maccabees 12:43-45)

The Book of Maccabees gives us an example of those who trusted in the resurrection of life. We should pray for our beloved dead so that "if any stain of sin have clung to them, or any fault have effected them, it may be forgiven and wiped away." (Pray of offering for the dead, Third Roman Missal).

We hope in the Resurrection of Christ and His saving power. We also know that each of us has been affected by sin. So we both hope for resurrection and pray for forgiveness for the benefit of the dead. It is our bodies that allow us to offer sacrifice, as Christ offered himself as a perpetual sacrifice to God the Father, through His body. We can offer sacrifices on behalf of those who have died. Since their souls are separated from their bodies, they are unable to offer sacrifices for themselves. We offer sacrifice in union with the eternal sacrifice of Christ in the celebration of mass. The mass is where all the souls of the Saints and the faithful departed gather with us around the altar to "make of us an eternal offering" (Third Roman Missal, Eucharistic Prayer III) to God the Almighty Father. We have much to pray for this November; may we offer our prayers, especially for our beloved dead through the intercession of All the Saints.

Harrison Butker's impact on the football field is tremendous. As the kicker for the Kansas City Chiefs, he was a vital component to the team's victory in Super Bowl LIV.

But the morning after the game, as he told the attendees at the Knights of Columbus 55th annual College Councils Conference, he still had to take out the garbage. This simple act was a humbling reminder to him while on top of the football world.

"Outside of the bright lights of the stadium, with the fans and the notoriety that come with being an NFL player, the greatest impact that I will make with my time on this earth is remaining dedicated to my primary vocation — helping my family get to heaven," he said.

Butker, a member of the Knights of Columbus who joined while a student-athlete at Georgia Tech, challenged College Knights to make an impact on their communities and college campuses by "showing by our actions what a Christ-centered life looks like put into practice." Butker, 25, told the attendees that the "world needs Knights" and to rise above the "unfriendly" and "hostile" cancel culture spreading across college campuses. "WHO WAS J. J. PALMER?"

We know one of the K of C's most prestigious awards is named after him, but how manyof us know who he really was. James J. Palmer lived from 1910 to 1974. He was married to Nora Davis in 1934 and they went on to parent four children and 12 grandchildren.

James joined the Knights of Columbus in 1949, and proceeded to be a Past Grand Knight of Pittsburgh Council #491, President of the Pittsburgh Chapter, Manager of the Knighthood Degree Team of Western Pennsylvania. He also served as State Chairman, District Deputy and Master of the Second PA District, Calvert Province of the Fourth Degree, and General Chairman of three State Conventions.

He also served on the Bishop's Project Board, was director of the "Knights and Nobles" charities and a Delegate to the C Y A. James J. Palmer was a man who sought not self recognition, but whose concern it was that the work of others, not go unnoticed. He was a man who had a unique way of getting others to work for him, because he did not shy away from work himself.

Such was the man we remember. The memory of a deep devotion to Christ, a warm love of family and friends, and an openness to the world as God made it.

Let us hold on to that memory with gratitude and pride, of having had the privilege to name our highest award in his honor.
